

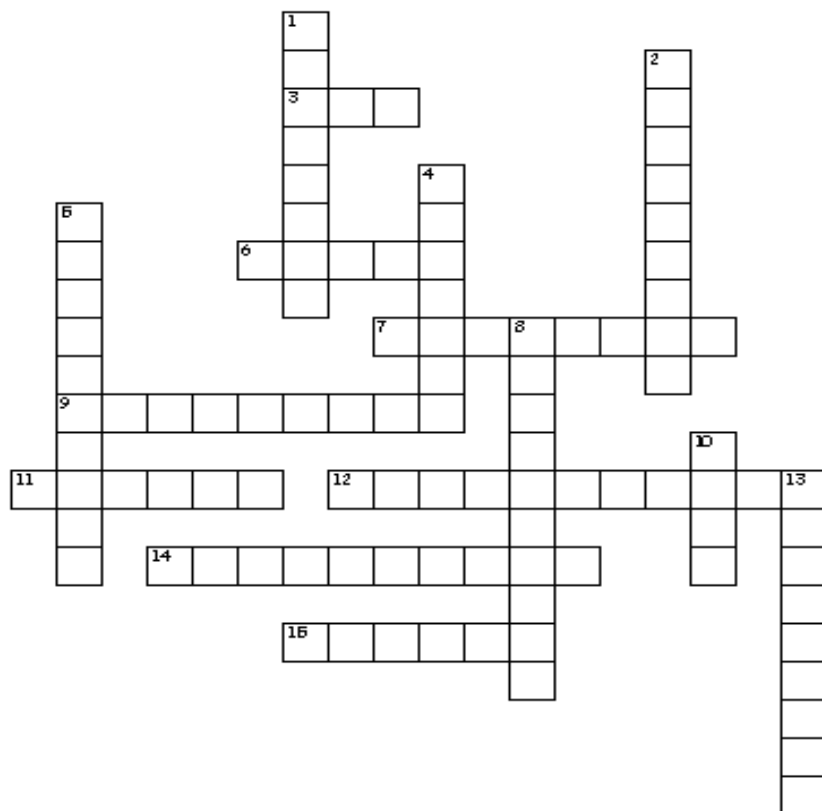

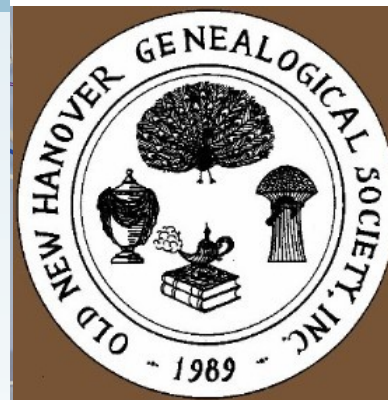

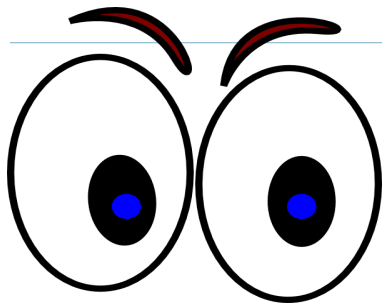

Overlooked marriages & deaths notices

Abstracts from the Wilmington Journal weekly 1844-1847, a continuing series from the previous Clarendon Courier. These notices identified as OVERLOOKED after discovering them left out from other publications featuring mid-19th century Wilmington newspapers.

Wilmington Journal weekly Friday 2 January 1846 page 3

MARRIED—In this town, on Thursday evening the 1st inst., by the Rev. Dr. **Drane**, Mr. **Jno S. Richards**, Merchant of this town, to Miss **Ann Williams**, late of London, England.

M—At Fort Johnston, Smithville, N. C., on the 23d ult., by the Rev. Dr. **Drane**, **Lieut. D. P. Woodbury**, of the U. S. Engineer Corps, to Miss **Catherine R.**, daughter of **Lieut. Col. Thomas Childs**, of the U. S. Army.

M—In Sampson county, on the 10th ult., by the Rev. Mr. **Conoly**, Mr. **Hinton E. Carr**, to Miss **Elizabeth**, daughter of **John Royal**, Sen.

DIED—In this town, on the 28th ult., at 12, P. M. Lt. **William Henry Wright**, of the "United States Corps of Engineers," aged 31.

Wilmington Journal weekly Friday 9 January 1846 page 3

DIED—In Sussex county, N. J., on the 23d December, Mrs. **Elizabeth**, consort of **Wm. Mattison**, Esq., in the 60th year of her age. She was the daughter of one of the first settlers of the county, and a defender of the constitution through the revolutionary struggle. She had been for 40 years a member of the Presbyterian Church and resigned her spirit to Him who gave it, almost without a struggle, in the full hope of a blissful immortality beyond the grave. The deceased was the mother of Mr. **J B. Mattison**, Carpenter, in this town.

Wilmington Journal weekly Friday 16 January 1846 page 3

DIED—On the 9th inst., in the city of New York, **Elizabeth Hill Turk**, in the 17th year of her age.

D—In this county, on the 26th ult., Mrs. **Lancy Moore**, consort of **John Moore**, Esq., in the 56th year of her age.

D—On Black River, on Thursday, the 8th inst., of Pulmonary Consumption, after an illness of four months, Mr. **James Lewis**, aged 90 years, a soldier of the revolution. He died in full hope of a blessed immortality beyond the grave. He was a member of the Baptist Church for many years. "Go spirit of the sainted dead, .."

Wilmington Journal weekly Friday 23 January 1846 page 3

DIED—In this town, on Saturday last, **Henrietta L.**, daughter of Mr. **Murphy V. Jones**, aged 1 year and 10 days .

D—In the vicinity of Fayetteville, on the 10th inst., at an advanced age, Col. **John Black**, formerly Sheriff of Cumberland county. TRIBUTE OF RESPECT. A portion of the Officers of the 33d Regiment of N. C. Militia, having attended at the funeral of Col. John Black, as pall bearers, on Sabbath afternoon, 11th January, 1846, retired after the service, and organized by calling Maj. **John H. Cook** to the Chair, and appointing Capt. **Bayne** as Secretary. The Chair having explained the object of the meeting, Capt. **McLean** introduced the follow Resolutions: *Resolved*, That the Officers of the meeting now present, will wear, and recommend to other Officers of the 33d Regiment, to wear crape on the left arm, for the space of 30 days, as a mark of respect to the deceased.
