PROGRAM: Covered dish dinner on the grounds and brief meeting

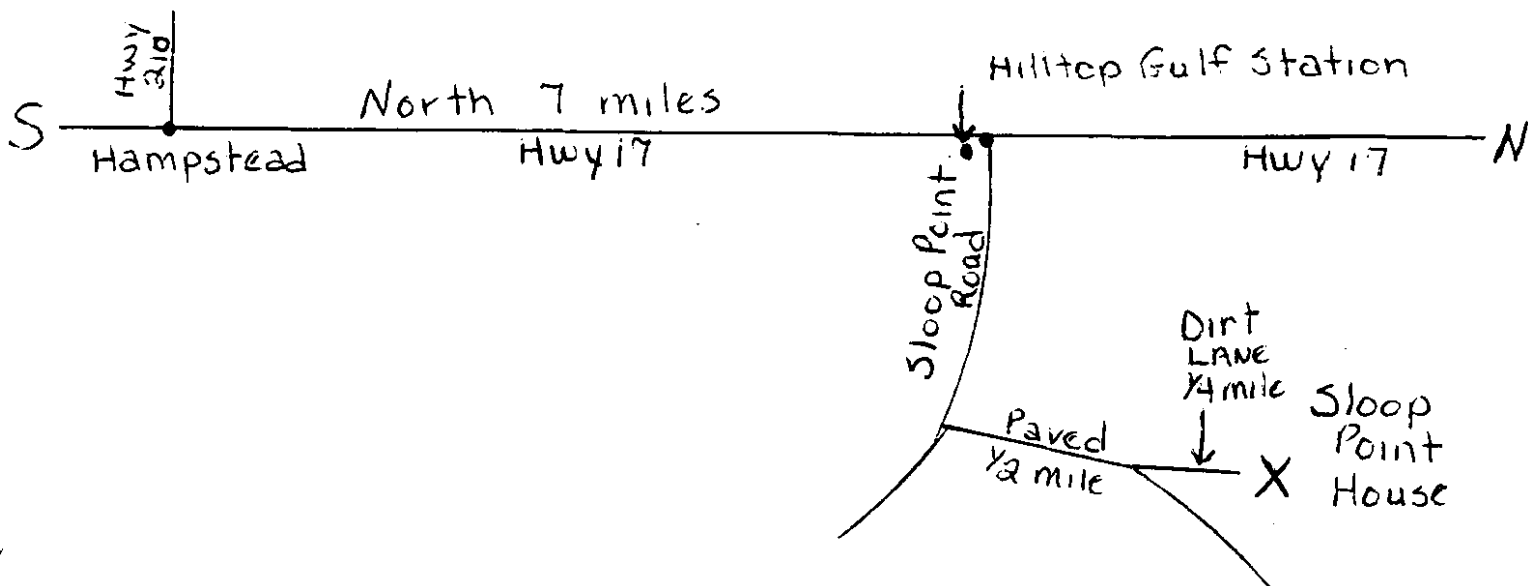

The season is at hand when people will be taking vacations, going to family reunions, and seeing folks they do not often visit. If you plan these trips to include research, it would be a good idea to do a bit of planning in advance. Consider the following tips:

- (1) Be sure that you have done your homework and exhausted the records in your local repositories, (N. C. Archives, local library and court-houses). Do not waste vacation time on research that can be done in your home county.
- (2) When visiting a courthouse, archives or library, be sure to check in advance on hours of operation.
- (3) Before you start your research project, be sure to make a research calendar, or at least know what it is you plan to look for. Pedigree charts and family group sheets, completed with the information you already know, will be most helpful. Your visit will be much more productive if you plan it well and follow through.
- (4) Take a camera and tape recorder, if you can. These two items are so helpful when looking for ancestors in cemeteries and talking with folks in person whom you do not often see.
- (5) Last but not least - DOCUMENT, DOCUMENT, DOCUMENT!!! Have a happy and safe summer, and good hunting!

A LIFE CRUSHED OUT

An Old Man Killed by a Passenger Train

Mr. Thomas Southerland, an old white man about seventy-five years of age, was killed at Smith's Creek about two miles north of the city by train No. 66 which left this city yesterday afternoon at 3:45 o'clock bound North on the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad. The conductor in charge of the train was Mr. W. T. Pittway and the engineer was Mr. Jack Bissett.

Mr. Southerland was walking on the bridge when he met his tragic death and it is supposed he did not hex the train upon its approach, as he was hard of hearing. The train was behind time and was running at the rate of about thirty miles an hour when the accident occurred. When the locomotive struck the old man he was facing the train and was walking with his head bent down, carrying a walking stick in his right hand and basket on his left arm. Four boys from the city who were gathering moss near the bridge, observed the peril of his position and exclaimed to the old man to get off the bridge. It is presumed he did not hear them, as he walked on with his head down..... The deceased had twenty five cents, a knife, some tobacco and a memorandum book in his pocket.....It is learned that the deceased resided near Hallsville, Duplin County, and that he left home yesterday morning to walk to the city.....Messrs. T. J. Southerland and C. H. Southerland, who are distant relatives of the deceased, learned of his death last night and had the remains removed to the establishment of Mr. J. H. Woolvin, the undertaker.....The deceased leaves a wife and three sons.

Note: Dean Southerland Jarrett, newly elected President of the Old New Hanover Genealogical Society, is the Great-Granddaughter of Thomas Jefferson Southerland, (15 Nov 1814 - 9 Mar 1888). He was married to Emily Williams of Onslow County, N. C. The children were: Cooper, Mary, Rebecca C., Nancy, William A., Daniel W., Gaston W. and Elizabeth. (Cooper, the oldest son, was killed in the Civil War in 1862; thus the mention of three sons in the newspaper. The daughters were not noted.)

This case was in litigation for more than a year and numerous articles were in The Wilmington Messenger through 18 April 1889.

Miss Jessie Ione Biggs, 96, died Tuesday at Davis Health Care Center. Miss Biggs was born in Scotland County, N. C., on May 5, 1891, the daughter of the late John Calvin and Lenora Gibson Biggs. She was a retired school teacher of the New Hanover County School System, having taught at Tileston School for many years. She was a member of Grace United Methodist Church.

Miss Biggs' only sister, Mrs. Louise Biggs Foard predeceased her in May 1980. Survivors include cousins, Mrs. Warren McNeill and Mrs. Sam Snead both of Red Springs, N. C. Graveside services will be conducted at 11:00 a.m. Friday in Oakdale Cemetery by the Rev. Francis Bradshaw.

ELEMENTS OF GOOD GENEALOGY COMPUTER PROGRAMS

What are the elements that should be within Genealogy Software Programs? First, of all the program should not restrict the organization or documentation of research data. There should be room for unlimited notes. Also, the program should allow individual referencing of every fact that appears on the group sheet or record card.

Second, the program should allow the user to make linkages between family members and also allow the user to tell if a linkage is positive or probable, adoptive or step, or any other type of link.

Third, the program should allow the user the ability to enter full documentation of the individual at the time the individual is entered into the program, rather than having to leave the Genealogy program and enter a separate stand alone Word Processing program to document the data.

Fourth, the program should allow the user the option of printing to a disk as well as the option of printing to the printer.

Fifth, the program should have a variety indexing options available.

Sixth, the ability to mark and move blocks of data from one report format to another should also exist.

Seventh, there should be a minimum amount of moving around within the program to get a individual entered in the system and also link the individual to his or her parents, brothers, sisters, etc.

These are some of the things we should think about as we use and/or review different Genealogy programs in the coming months.
