She has devoted many years to the study of Brunswick County history and has shared her knowledge with groups of devoted students who take her local history classes. Since it's beginning the Society has operated with two separate bank accounts. The General Fund has handled all of the income from dues, classes and workshops. The Book Department has been responsible for all income and expenses generated by the printing and selling of approximately 54 genealogical titles. At the start of our 1993-1994 year, beginning June 1, 1993, the two bank accounts have been combined. Future financial reports will be a combination of all income and expenses of the Society.

At the close of the 1992-1993 year, the financial records of the Society were audited and approved by the Audit Committee of George Willcox, Van Stilley, and Jim Stokely.

Through the activities of many Society and Public Library volunteers and under the leadership of Dean Jarrett, John Butler and Beverly Tetterton, the Society has been able to publish a remarkable number of genealogical publications. The fruits of these combined labors have gone back to the membership by contributing money to the Local History and Genealogy Room of the library to buy the many genealogy books and periodicals that they have purchased in the past year. At the same time two copies of each book published by the Society are given to our local library, two copies are given to the Library of Congress, and one copy is given to the genealogical section of the State Library of North Carolina located in Raleigh.

At a Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions began and held for the county of New Hanover at the Court House in Wilmington Monday the 7th day of April A.D., 1806. The court was opened with the usual proclamations. Present the Worshipful: Robert Nixon, Wm. Giles, Sam'l Ashe, Richard Nixon.

A h. on the estate of Wm. Benton granted to Wm. Wilkinson, he giving bond in 200 lb. with James Allen and Thomas Jennings as secys.

Admn. on the estate of Jonathan Huntingdon granted to Sarah Huntingdon, she giving bond in 300 lb. with John Blanks and Samuel Ashe as secys.

Ordered that Thomas Jennings, guardian to Ann, Elizabeth, George, and Mary Jennings do pay Charity Jennings 50 lb. per annwn for the board of each of the above minors.

Admn. on the estate of John Shuter granted to Samuel Shuter, he giving bond in 3500 lb. with Samuel R. Jocelyn and Richard Langdon as secys.

William P. Strudwick appointed guardian to Samuel Strudick, he giving bond in 4500 lb. with James Brownlaw and Richard Eagles as secys.

A deed from John G. Scull to John Pridgen proved by William Huffam subscribing witness thereto and ordered to be recorded.

A SAMPLING OF WILMINGTON SURNAMES, 1877

From the Wilmington Review, submitted by Bill Reaves.

Seeing in a paper a few days ago Newbern's boast of queer names, and thinking we could do better, I set my wife to work and here is the result:

We certainly have Low names and names Heyer and Strange also

We have Divines, a Pope, Bishops, Deans, Evangelists, Parsons. Abbots. Monks and Nunns.

Love with his Keen Darts Pierces Gay Young Harts and even Whiteheads and the wearers of Wiggs and Capps do not always escape his Weills. The Muses are ours, and even Angels honor us with their presence.

Wise Kings, Lords and Dukes are equals to the Whiteman, Blackman, Freeman, Newman, Reichman, Orr the Cumming Mann, and Strong Savages.

Graingers and Farmers who fill their Barns with Rice and Cotton, while Husks and Cobbs around show they also supply Millars with other grain, which Sellers retail by the Peck at different Prices, as they do Buttons by the Gross.

Gardners display taste in Bowers and raise Flowers, Blossoms, Blooms. Lillys, Poppe's, Lavender and Parsley. Quinces, Hawes and Berrys are numerous while Nutts and Chestnuts are abundant, as seen by the Burrs around.

Shepherds care for the Lambs which Roan o'er Hill, Dell and Moore, by Brinks and Pitts, and through the Groves where the Doves and Robbins make Sweet music.

Mallards, Drakes, Eagles. Martins and Crows furnish amusement to Fowlers, Hunters, a Shotter and Bowman. Animals too are found. Fleet Coneys, Barkers, Katz and Sharp Wilder Bears and Lyons. Fish, (or as French say) Poissons, such as Herring and Whiting are caught with Bates in our Waters. We have a Garrison with Cannon, Bridgers, even London Bridge over the Thames and we can't be Dry with Wells, Dranes and Myers.

The Scott is here, the French from Calais and Holland too are represented. People with Smallbones and Boney people, for whom we have Cushings.

We have Banks for Silva and Cash; and our Cashwell cared for by a Pennypacker, unless it is a Swindell, except the men of Sterling Worth and Merritt.

We have Meares, Harshalls, an Alderman and Registers.

There are Carrs which have Gornto the Farr West for several Furlongs by a Way New and Wright.

By Day, Walkers, Amblers, Springers, and Skippers Hussell each other and Dodge and Rush about the Lanes.

Dews and Frosts fall by Knight, when we have Revels with Pipers, Harpers and Players on the Fyfe.

Masons, Plummers, Joyners, Turners and Carpenters make Brickhouses for Tennants, but they Cantwell do without Posts, Gates, Lattas, Barrs, Lockes and Keas with Halls and Storys.

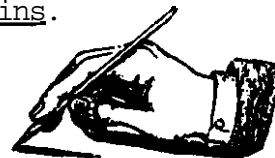
Our Craft made by skilled Boatwrights display their Bunting as they glide by the Buies in our harbor. We have Smiths who live by the Sweat of their brow, also Taylors, Cutlers and a Workman. Our Potters make Bowles and Potts.

Colliers deal in Cole, Wood and Ashes. Our Cooks have Oldham, Dunham and Topham. Our Baker makes White and Brown bread, which he never Burns, but it Cutts.

The Dyers color Green, Redd, Black or Gray.

Our livery stable is well kept by a Curry.

And, alas! Howe often do Paynes in Hands, Fingers or Leggs call for draughts from Oldenbuttell's for relief - perhaps in expressions such as Doggett, Dahmer or Dickens, and sometimes find in only in Coffins.



A RECORD OF THE PAST

[Continued from the September 1993 Courier (1795-1820). From the Daily Journal, Friday April 9, 1875, page 4, submitted by Joan Kerr Brown.]

A gentleman of this city has just exhibited to me a very interesting record of the past ages. It is the "Catalogue of the Members Dialectic Society of the University of North Carolina," containing a full list of the members of that Society from its institution, June 1795, to the close of the year 1851.

We find in its pages the names of many of our most honored citizens, a few of whom are now alive, the majority having passed to the farther shore. In the class of "1821 we find" Dr. Armand J. DeRosset, Dr. John Walters, Dr. John L. Wright, Wm. A. Wright, Thomas Cowan, Maurice Q. Waddell, Hugh Y. Waddell; 1822, Dr. Issac Baker, Dr. Thomas Bunting, Dr. John H. Hill; 1823, James M. McColl; 1824, Alfred Waddell; 1825, John P. Gause, Junius C. Dunbibin, Henry A. London, Joshua G. Wright; 1826, John P. Brown, Alfred M. Moore; 1827, Prof. J. DeBerniere Hooper, F.O. Hill; 1830. Dr. E.A. Anderson; 1831, F.W. Swann; 1833, A.D. Swann; 1834, Hon. Geo. Davis, Dr. W.W. Davis; 1835, P.E. Bradley, Col. Thomas D. Meares; 1836, Jno. A. Lillington; 1837, Dr. R.H. Joseph Wilson, colored, of this county (**Mecklenburg**), went down to the Cape Fear to help throw up breastworks at Fort Fisher. At the first opportunity, he deserted to the Federals. Now Joseph is a pensioner. He is actually on the pension rolls and this morning went to the bank with his papers and drew \$74.00 pension money.

SOME NEW HANOVER COUNTY RECORDS DESTROYED DURING THE CIVIL WAR

[From the Wilmington Dispatch, September 9, 1923. submitted by Bill Reaves].

The detstable activities of Sherman were recalled to mind yesterday when David Sinclair, Jr., a member of the local bar, sought to locate records in the office of the clerk of court dating back as far as 1797 and was advised by Major W.N. Harriss that these records, along with many more valuable papers of the county were burned in Lumberton by the federal general.

The county's records were removed to Lumberton. Major Harriss said, when it became evident that the city would fall into the hands of the federals with the giving in of Fort Fisher. However, Lumberton proved no safer place than Wilmington and many valuable records went up in smoke.

NEW HANOVER COUNTY DEED BOOK C



[Many of New Hanover County's earliest records have been destroyed by Courthouse fires. The first two deed books, A and B, were combined to form Book AB. They have been abstracted and published by ONHGS member Mae Blake Graves. New Hanover County was formed in 1729 from Craven County. Bladen and Onslow Counties were formed from New Hanover in 1734, Duplin County in 1750, Brunswick County in 1764, part of New Hanover was annexed to Sampson County in 1795, and Pender County was formed from New Anover in 1875. The following abstract of Deed Book C which covers many early records for these areas was compiled by Ida Brooks Kellam in 1939. Continued from the September 1993 Courier].

Richard Marsden of Brunswick Cape Fear in North Carolina"... "All such sums of money as may be due from him and from Mrs. Margaret Marsden, his daughter." Recorded 1745.

Page 63. March 13, 1744. John Watson, Planter of New Hanover County to Ephraim Vernon, Planter, of same place lot in Wilmington, N.C.

Page 63. Feb. 18, 1744. John McLemy of New Topsail, Planter, of New Hanover County, North Carolina, to Michael Lowber, Planter of same place, land joining Benj' Mott, Henry Skibbow, "Wm Swanns alias John Stoakleys." Wit: Francis Alexander, Catherine Henderson.

Page 64. Will of John Benson. "I John Benson of New Hanover County, Imprimis: I give unto my wife Ede Benson one third part of all my personal estate. I give unto my son James ye plantation whereon I now live to be his immediately after his mother's decease. I will that ye rest and residue of my estate be equally divided amongst my three children (viz) James, Mary, and Elizabeth. And I hereby Constitute and appoint Francis Roads and John Porter to be my Execrs. of this my Last Will and Testament." In witness thereof I have set my hand and seal this 14th day of Feby. 1744. John Benson (SEAL) Wit: William Lewis, John Robinson. John Potter. Proved March 1744.

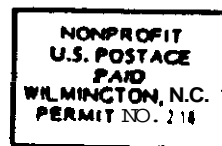
