CHURCH RECORDS

One of the first things that many of our ancestors did when **arriving** in the New World was to **identify** with a church. They would often find a strong cultural link to their homeland in their religious affiliation, especially for those who did not speak English.

**Identifying** which denomination our ancestors belonged to can be **difficult** in itself. During the colonial period, churches were quasi-political organizations. For tax purposes, our area was organized into two parishes - St. Philip's on the west bank of the Cape Fear River and St. James on the east side. Both were Anglican or Church of England. After the revolution and the state support of religion was abolished, many sought refuge in a number of different sects. The country of origin for the ancestor may give clues as to where they were members. For example, in general, **immigrants** from the northern part of Germany were Lutheran or Reformed, while those from the south were Roman Catholic. Many of the large number of Highland Scots were Presbyterians.

Another problem effecting church membership was that the denomination of one's choice may not have been established nearby the settler's homes. Particularly in rural areas, it is well to check the closest congregation, one that would require a short journey to attend.

In North Carolina, early vital statistics recorded by religious organizations before 1913, are valuable resources for the genealogist. Almost every denomination kept some type of records of its membership, births, baptisms, deaths and business. Unfortunately, many do not **survive** because they were lost or destroyed by fire. Organized in 1818, the First Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, has had at least three fires in its long history; the last was the New Year's Eve fire in 1925. Thus, their records date only from 1926.

These records are only as good as the pastor or person writing them. Some ministers were meticulous in recording the data and would write the cause of death and the burial place of the member, sometimes with interesting comments such as the place of birth, parents' names or unusual circumstances surrounding the death. Other scribes

gave the barest of detail.

Don't forget to look at the membership rolls, especially for people who spent a relatively short time in a particular area. Noted next to the communicate's name may be "gone to Texas," or "returned to Germany."

Minutes are another type of church records. Usually, the proceedings give a list of church leaders and extensive comments about the church's business and membership. However, don't be surprised if your ancestor was dismissed from the roll for such offences as non-attendance, dancing, non-support, etc. Mrs. Ida B. Kellam transcribed the *Minutes of the First Baptist Church, Wilmington, 1833-1847*, a copy of which is in the North Carolina Room of the New Hanover Public Library. It makes interesting reading and there are many names recorded in this book. Sometimes, the early minutes of a church may be written in a foreign language. Those of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church were written in German until about 1871. They have been translated into English, a copy of which is in the Library.

All denominations have state and national organizations that have extensive archives, particularly if you are looking for someone who was in the ministry or connected with a church in an official capacity. These records may contain early newsletters, journals, statistical reports, etc. For example, in North Carolina, the Baptist Historical Collection at the Z. Smith Reynolds Library at Wake Forest University; the Presbyterian one is located at Montreat, NC. Any church will have the address of their organization's archives.

Since church records are considered private, it is well to call or write a letter of inquiry before visiting the location. This will save your time if the records are not in your time frame or if they have been lost or destroyed. Most records are in the custody of ministers, but usually, a church of any age will have an archivist or historian to assist you. There may be some restrictions on copying very old registers, depending on the physical condition of the books.

**NEW HANOVER COUNTY DEED BOOK "D"**

[ Many of New Hanover Count's earliest records were destroyed by courthouse fires. What was left of the county's first two deed books, A and B, was combined to form AB. This book was abstracted many years ago by Mae Blake Graves. Deed Book C was published in the *Courier* from 1992 to 1996. This series of abstracts from Deed Book D began in the Summer 1977 issue of the *Courier*. New Hanover was formed in 1729 from Craven County. Bladen and Onslow counties were formed from New Hanover in 1734, Duplin County in 1750, Brunswick County in 1764, part of New Hanover was annexed to Sampson County in 1795, and Pender County, last but not least, broke away from New Hanover in 1875. The following abstract of Deed Book D, which covers many early records from the above counties, was compiled by Ida Brooks Kellam in 1939 and 1940.1

Page 313 - Nov. 5, 1757 - Cornelius **Harnett** and **Marmaduke Jones**, Esq of Wilmington Executors of the will of William **Faris**, Esqr. to Anthony **Ward** of New Hanover County a lot in Wilimington on Market Street joining lands of Jacob **Miller**, Alice **Marsden**

Page 314 - William **Faris** to James **Gregory** a lot on Market Street, Jan. 3, 1757.

Page 315 - David **Evans**, blacksmith of New Hanover Co. to his son, Benjamin **Evans**, 320 acres. Jan. 7, 1758. Wit: James **Wright**, William **Bevill**.

**A LIST OF THE WOUNDED, CAPTURED, OR KILLED  
AT FORT FISHER  
JANUARY 15, 1865**

[This series (which began in the Fall 1996 Courier) lists soldiers who were wounded, captured, or killed at the Battle of Fort Fisher. The wounded and captured were sent to Elmira Prison in New York or Point Lookout Prison in Maryland. The following abbreviations are used: Reg. For Regiment; Bat. For Battalion; N.C.T. for North Carolina Troops; N.C.S.T. for North Carolina State Troops; N.C.H Art. for North Carolina Heavy Artillery; N.C.L. Art. for North Carolina Light Artillery; and \* indicates that the soldier was killed in action. The 10'' Regiment included the 1<sup>st</sup> N.C. Artillery; the 36'' N.C. Regiment included the 2<sup>nd</sup> N.C. Artillery; and the 40'' Regiment included the 3<sup>rd</sup> Artillery]

**Saint Thomas The Apostle To India Roman Catholic Church Records  
Combined Register of Baptisms, Marriages and Deaths, Wilmington, NC**

Thomas Murphy, Vicar Forane, the first full time priest in Wilmington, was appointed in January 1845 by **Ignatius Aloysius** Reynolds, Second Bishop of the Diocese of Charleston. Murphy superintended the construction of the Gothic Revival style St. Thomas Church, built by 1847, continuing Wilmington's Catholic history. This is the fourth in a series of St. Thomas records transcribed by Joseph Sheppard. These registers, taken from microfilm housed in the New **Hanover** Public Library, contain six volumes dating from 1845 to 1968. Baptisms list the child or adult, parents (P.P.), sponsors (S.S.) and the presiding priest. Marriages include bride and groom, witnesses (W.W.) and serving minister. Deaths are recorded with the name of deceased and officiating clergyman. Obsequies are proper and appropriate duties in regard to the dead.
